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



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what's next?

SKILL-

Practice number sequencing from 1 to 130.

PREP-

Print the pumpkin cards on cardstock to give them extra durability. Cut along the lines to separate the pieces.

If you'll be using the activity in a classroom, you may also want to laminate the cards for extra durability.

Print one record sheet for each child.

NOTE-

This is a great chance to differentiate! For younger students, use just the numbers 1 to 20. Add more numbers for students who are ready for a challenge.

Also, have a hundred chart handy for students to reference if they need to.

PLAY-

Students pick up one card at a time, read the number and write it in a pumpkin on their record sheet. Then they write the three numbers that come next on the lines next to it.

For instance, if a child picked up 45, she would write "45" in one of the pumpkins. Then she would write "46, 47, 48" on the lines beside it.

Play continues until the page is complete.
